from the back patios. After moving in, she found herself surrounded by neighbors who quickly became friends. After all these years, she still considers the social aspects of the community one of the best features.

• New, Larger Residences

Site work has begun and plans are being finalized for a small expansion of our cottage community. The plans include a triplex, a duplex, and a single cottage. The new Farm Crest Drive cottages will feature amenities and options not previously available, including two-car garages and expanded floor plans. Construction will begin as cottages are reserved, and could start as early as this spring.


When the call came that a cottage was available, George seized
