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Prayer Dedication Launches New Project

What better way to recognize Fairmount's 50 years of service than by beginning a new building project! After a meaningful 50th Anniversary Celebration in February, one of the most significant events of this milestone year was the Prayer Dedication Service held Monday, July 23, launching the new Wheat Ridge Apartments project. Attendees included Fairmount residents, members of the Board of Directors and Advisory Board, team members, and future Wheat Ridge Apartment residents.

The program began with a welcome by Fairmount President/CEO Jerry D. Lile. He first introduced Fairmount Board Chairman Ken Burkholder, who spoke about the value of this expansion project. Ken noted that Fairmount's emphasis has always been on people, not buildings. Adding a second apartment building enables Fairmount to serve a greater number of residents, benefitting the entire community. Reflecting on Fairmount's progress, Jerry says, "We have so much support from the broader community. That's a major reason we have succeeded for half a century. As we look forward to another 50+ years, we are eager to see how this new facility will serve the needs of both our current and future residents."

Project Begins with Personal Care Renovation

While the primary focus is on the new 4-story, 45-unit apartment building, an equally exciting component of the project is the expansion and renovation of the Wheat Ridge Personal Care (WRPC) building—the first phase of the construction. A new activity room, lounge, and nurses station will be added to the center of the current building. This design will centralize the areas WRPC residents use on a daily basis, making them more easily accessible. Residents will not have to walk far to participate in activities, receive medications, or relax in the lounge with music, a book, a newspaper, or a jigsaw puzzle. The current activity room will be converted to a new dining room, and the increasingly popular Cat's Back Café will expand into the space currently occupied by the existing dining room, accommodating more staff, residents, and visitors.

Another component of the project will create direct access between the new apartment building and the Wheat Ridge building. This will make it possible for spouses in the new apartments to visit their husbands/wives in rehab or skilled nursing without going outside.

New Apartments With Many Options

Concurrent with the WRPC modifications, construction of the new apartment building will begin. Completion is slated for the fall of 2019 when 45 brand new units in 11 different floor plans will open for occupancy. Plans include a wellness room, gathering room, library, and outside courtyard with a bocce ball court.


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
