COVID-19 TESTING

Fairmount team members, volunteers and residents in Health Care and Personal Care tested for COVID-19 this week. The results were as follows:

- 304 negative results
- 0 positive results

We give thanks to God that we have had no positive results among team members or residents the last two weeks. Health Care and Personal Care are now considered “Green Zones,” as long as we continue to have negative results in our twice-weekly testing. Despite being “Green” we still are limited to window visits only. Once the county COVID positivity rate dips below 10% for two consecutive weeks and we have no new positive cases among our residents and team members, we can initiate implementation of supervised in-person visitation.

DOGWOOD HALLWAY UPDATE

There was one admission into the Dogwood dedicated COVID treatment center this week and one discharge. To date, we have cared for 122 individuals in Dogwood since early April 2020. The Dogwood hallway was modified this week and will now have only one bed dedicated for COVID-19 positive patients. The hallway will still be negative pressure to prevent cross contamination. However, non-COVID positive residents will be admitted into the hallway.
