Cottage residents Luke and Dottie Nolt were drawn to Fairmount when they found a cottage with a walk-out basement. The cottage provides plenty of room for Luke's gardening tools and has a kitchen that Dottie loves. Both are captivated by the view from their home. But most valuable to them is the sense of community they found at Fairmount.

Luke was an engineer by profession and also served as a pastor for many years. In his pastoral role, Luke visited many retirement communities but was always impressed by the sense of community Fairmount embodied. "We knew only one couple when we got here," Luke says. "But we have made many friends by plugging into lots of the activities. It is a place where people accept each other and which proved the best fit for us."

"I like the Christian atmosphere and what Fairmount stands for—faith, family, and community—and I would add *friendliness*! Most of all, it is the security of knowing I will be taken care of if my health declines, which puts my family at ease too."

His daughter, Charlene Ranck, has spent lots of time at Fairmount. She explains, "My husband's grandmother lived in the original building years ago. I would bring my children to visit, and we witnessed her getting the best of care. Then when my mother became ill about five years ago, we were very comfortable when my parents chose to move here—my dad into Personal Care, and my mom into Health Care—so they could be near each other.
