From Belize to Fairmount: A Legacy of Service

F or Bill and Judy Houser, service has been a central thread weaving through their lives—spanning continents, cultures and now their new home at Fairmount. The couple, who moved to Fairmount in April 2025, has long embraced the Mennonite values of faith, community and helping others.

Early Years and Global Service

Bill was born and raised in Lampeter, attending Willow Street Mennonite Church, while Judy grew up in Jonestown, Lebanon County, as part of Dohner Mennonite Church. Bill and Judy first crossed paths in 1967 at a rural health clinic in British Honduras, where Judy was serving as a nurse and Bill had arrived for church voluntary service. They married in 1971, and in 1973, returned to the country, now renamed Belize, where they dedicated the next 10 years to service.

During that time, Bill's work included pastoral duties and agricultural development. Together they helped with a successful refugee resettlement project for families from El Salvador.

Continuing Service in Pennsylvania

Returning to the U.S., Bill and Judy were delighted to find opportunities to serve through teaching, volunteering and mentoring. Both were deeply involved with Mennonite and Brethren Marriage Encounter programs, and later, the Engaged Encounter program. Their dedication to service often extended to hosting international students over the holidays, forging lifelong friendships that now span countries and decades. More recently, Judy taught English to Afghan refugee women—a role she particularly cherished.

Serving At Fairmount

Since arriving at Fairmount Homes, the Housers have eagerly found ways to continue serving. Judy volunteers at the Morgantown ReUzit Shoppe. At Fairmount, she participates in wheelchair transportation and is exploring further opportunities to visit residents and assist with HealthDrive, a monthly program that provides on-site eye, podiatry and dental appointments for residents. For her, volunteering has fostered meaningful connections that are always a source of joy, echoing the relationships they built across the globe.

Bill joins the Monday Prayer Walk praying for residents, team members and volunteers, helps with

caring for flower beds and assists with resident transportation on Sundays. "Service is a good way to get a feel for the community and stay aware of what's happening," he says. Participating in the Prayer Walk, in particular, has given him a broader perspective on life at Fairmount. "You can never outgive God," he adds, emphasizing how service enriches not only the recipients but the giver as well.

Faith as the Foundation

The Houser's faith and upbringing have been the foundation of their calling. A map of the world hung on the kitchen wall as Judy was growing up. Her family would point out the location of missionaries as they prayed for them—an early lesson in the impact of faithful service. Together, Judy and Bill encourage fellow residents and staff to embrace service opportunities, as a way to engage with the community, gain perspective and allow God to work through their efforts.

Throughout their journey, the Housers have embodied Matthew 5:16: "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven." Their light continues to shine at Fairmount, reminding all of us that service is not just an action but a way of life.

Celebrating 30 Years

This year, we celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Perspective, Fairmount's quarterly newsletter, which began in February 1995 under the leadership of Kent Richard, now our Vice President of Operations.
